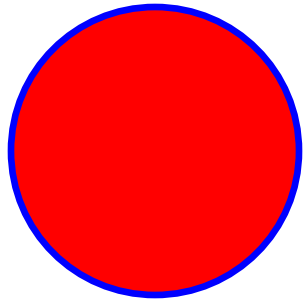


VERB

An **VERB** is a word that expresses action, existence, or occurrence.



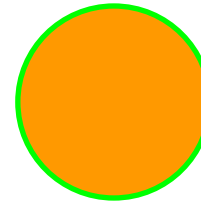

INTERJECTION

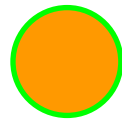
An **INTERJECTION** is a word, phrase, or sound used as an exclamation and can stand by itself.

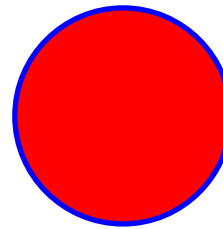

CONJUNCTIVE ADVERBS: Indicate clauses they connect are equal. Not only connect clauses but also modify the clauses they appear in.
Common conjunctive adverbs:

accordingly	finally	indeed	nevertheless	still
also	further	instead	next	then
anyway	furthermore	likewise	nonetheless	thereafter
besides	hence	meanwhile	now	therefore
certainly	however	moreover	otherwise	thus
consequently	incidentally	namely	similarly	undoubtedly

🎵🎵 **INTERJECTIONS**, show excitement or emotion they're generally set apart from a sentence by an exclamation point, or by a comma when the feelings not as strong.

So when you're happy "HURRAY!" or sad "AWWW!" or frightened "EEEEK!" or mad "RATS!" or excited "WOW!" or glad "HEY!", an interjection starts a sentence right.🎵🎵

*But is very seldom a preposition. When it is used as a preposition, *but* means the same as *except*--*Everyone ate frog legs but Jamie*. *But* usually functions as a coordinating conjunction.
